2022: a year for broadening our horizons

Next year we will celebrate Radio 2RPH's fortieth anniversary as a licensed radio service. After 5 years of test transmissions, in February 1983 Radio 2RPH started broadcasting in earnest from the University of NSW campus with a low-power signal and sharing a site with Australia's first educational radio service, 2UV.

of 2SM and a spare studio, was soon broadcasting 51 hours a week of its radio reading service for Sydney listeners.

Flash forward across four decades and we have the much-loved Radio 2RPH of the 21st century – an innovative, not-for-profit provider of radio reading services using AM, FM and digital platforms, reaching listeners across greater Sydney and since 2008 in Newcastle and the Lower Hunter and since March this year, Wollongong and the Illawarra.

This month marks my first year as the General Manager, and I can tell you that having a growing base of more than 180 skilled volunteers committed to providing high quality live readings and pre-recorded content-rich audio, is only just the start of what makes 2RPH a wonderful place to work. It is the opportunity to serve and enrich the lives of our listening community who access print media through audio delivery, that motivates me, as it does our dedicated and hardworking Board and staff.

The standout milestone for 2022 has been the launch in March of the extension of our broadcast coverage to Wollongong and the Illawarra which means that 2RPH broadcasts can now potentially can reach 76% of the NSW population. We have invested heavily in a continuous 24/7 transmission facility for Wollongong, and we went ahead in April and upgraded all three studios by installing digital consoles to provide high-end audio production and delivery capabilities.

In early August we launched the 2RPH *Broadening Horizons* fundraising appeal which we are still midway through, and we are asking for donations to support further improvements in our radio reading technical capacities, further skills development and training for on-air volunteers and to support making our premises more accessible for those with disability.

Government funding has somewhat alarmingly diminished over the past 2 years. As I said when launching our fundraiser, although we are 40% funded by government grants, it is generous support from donors, our listening community, volunteers and corporate partners, that will enable us to continue to broaden horizons.

I invite you to make a tax deductable donation to help us move forward into our 40th year and help us stay the course into the next phase of our station's development into new localised coverage. Meanwhile please continue to tune in and enjoy our rich array of daily readings via 1224AM, 100.5FM and DAB+ (digital) in Sydney, 100.5Fm in Newcastle/Lower Hunter and 93.3FM in Wollongong/Illawarra. We are also available via web streaming from wherever you may be.

Meet the volunteers: Stephen Christian

Regular readers will know we make a bit of a fuss about our volunteers with good reason. Without the nearly 200 volunteers we wouldn't be able to get all our broadcasts to air.

However, it's not just the on-air volunteers that keep things ticking along. John Martin spoke to Stephen Christian for Signals recently to find out what goes on behind the scenes.

Originally applying to be a reader he was asked if instead, he could help out with rostering. Despite his nerves about learning how to use new computer systems and a variety of spreadsheets containing details such as reader preferences for shows, days, and times, Stephen has been a vital member of the rostering team for almost 10 years.

When asked to describe what it is the tightknit team do, he says, "we keep the station running smoothly. We make sure everybody is there that should be, filling vacancies as required. As well as maintaining the roster, the team maintain the volunteer database, keeping track of their preferred days and shifts and when they're not available. So the primary role of rostering is to fill vacancies."



At any given time, the rostering team look after approximately 100 readers and announcers. For Stephen, the importance that 2RPH plays in the lives of our audience has provided the impetus to keep volunteering over the years, noting that he has "met a few listeners at various occasions and it highlights the service we provide for those that would otherwise struggle to be able to connect to the rest of the world."

Unfortunately, for us here at 2RPH, Stephen is leaving the station shortly after 10 years of service to return to his home town of Adelaide.

From all of us at 2RPH we wish Stephen an enjoyable second retirement with his family in Adelaide.
